

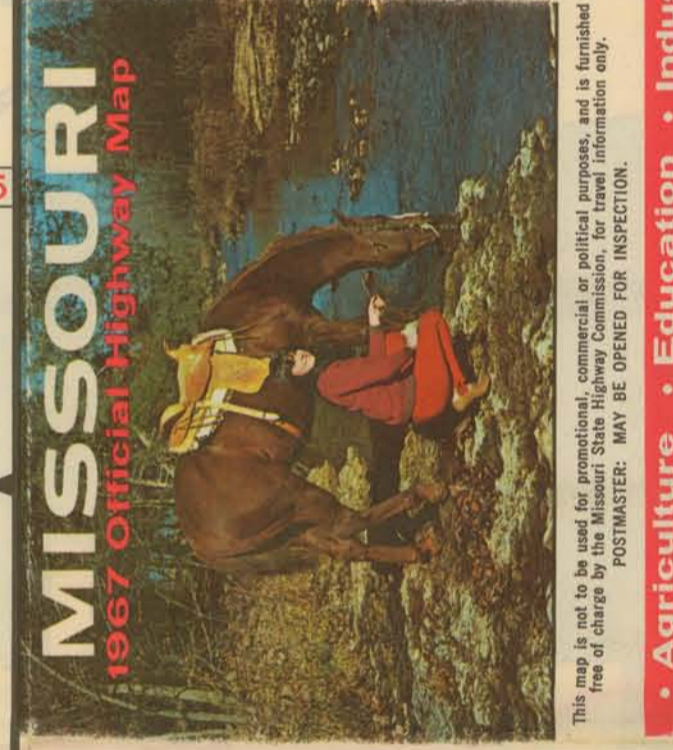
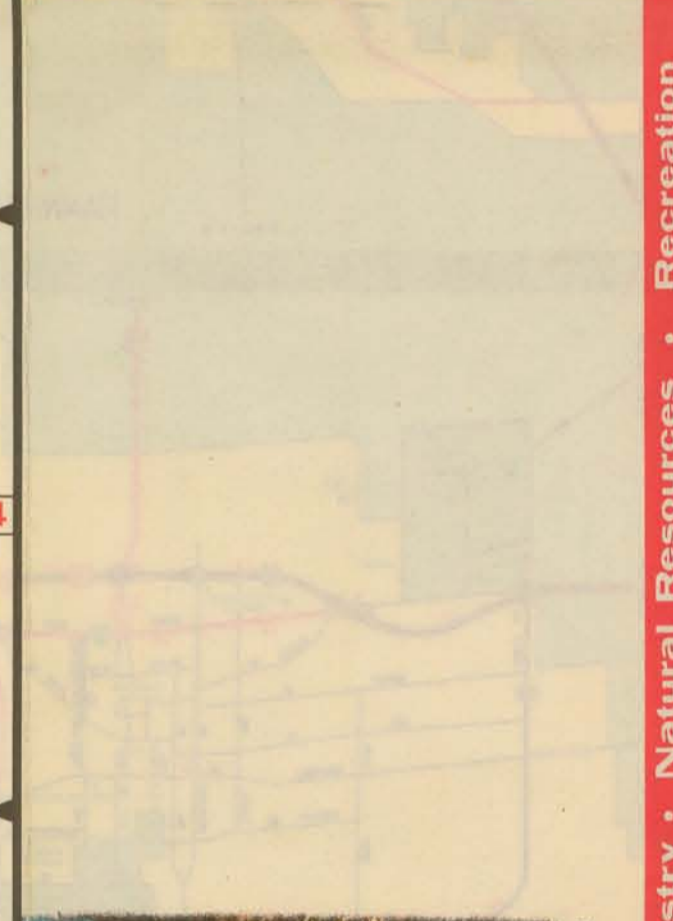
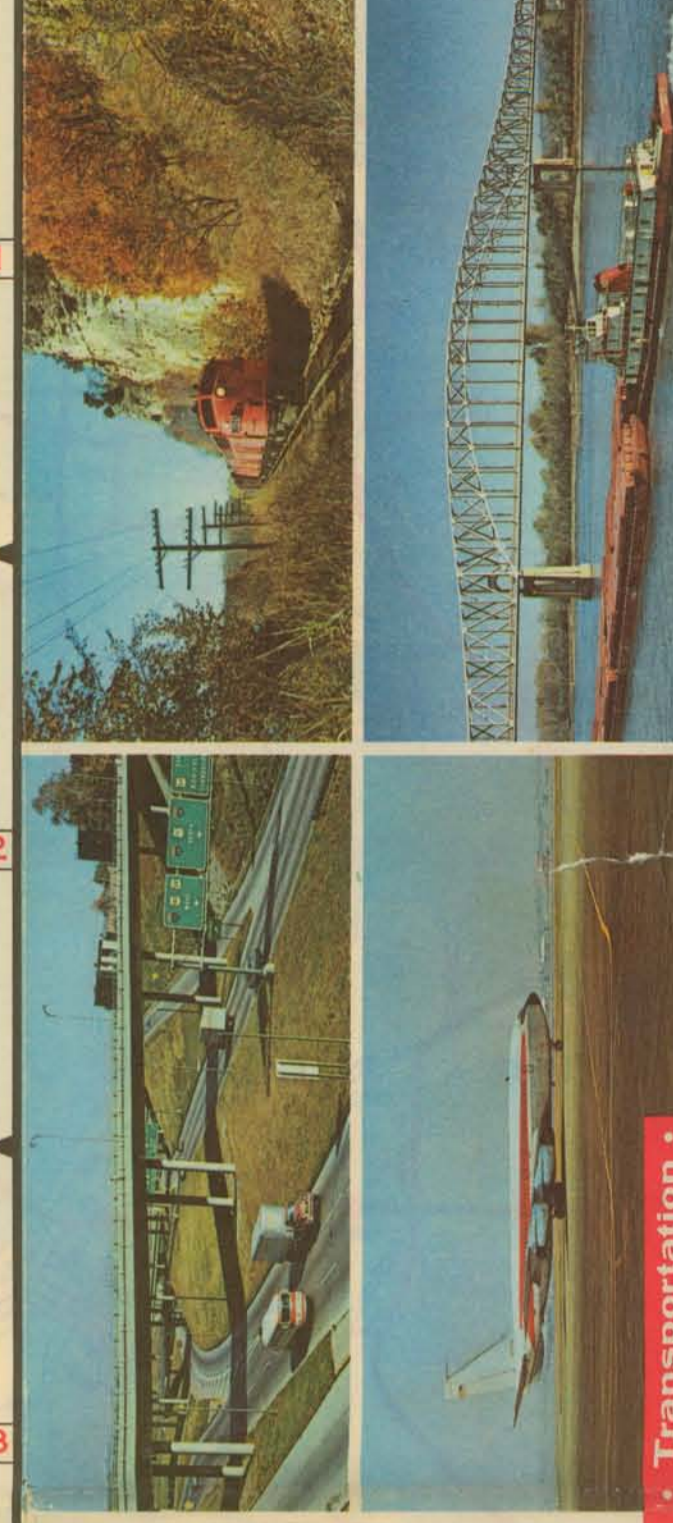
INDEX to CITIES and VILLAGES

in case of ACCIDENT... 1. Stop the vehicle at once. 2. Render all possible aid to the injured. 3. Notify the nearest police officer, sheriff or Highway Patrol officer. 4. Get the driver's name, residence, including city and street number, motor vehicle number and chauffeur's or operator's number. Give the same information to him about yourself. 5. If the accident involves a parked car or other property and you do not locate the owner, leave your name and address on the damaged property where the owner will find it and report the matter to the nearest enforcement authorities. 6. If the accident results in death or personal injury, or property damage exceeding \$100 to any one person, including yourself, you must file a report with the Safety Responsibility Unit of the Department of Revenue. 7. Report forms may be obtained from the Highway Patrol or from any office of the Department of Revenue.
